WHEN Miss Doris Molloy of Wexford was presented with her Associate of the Chartered Insurance Institute diploma last week there was prolonged applause from the all-male audience. In the history of the Institute, not more than four or five women in this country have added the letters A.C.I.I. to their names. Now she plans to study for her Fellowship, a distinction that no Irish woman has yet achieved. Educated at the St. John of God Convent, Wexford, and the Loreto Abbey, Gorey, Miss Molloy taught in a temporary capacity for more than two years in Co. Wexford schools. In 1953, she joined the staff of the Commercial Union Insurance office in her home town, and, at the same time, took an extra-mural course sponsored by U.C.D. receiving a diploma in sociology and economics. At present, she is having a hard-earned rest after the Wexford Festival, when she looked after the many costumes, some of which came from London and Florence. As a member of the Old Wexford Historical Society, she was one of ten guides who brought tourists to places of interest in the county during the summer. Miss Molloy is also actively engaged in the French Society, the German Society and the gramophone circle—in fact, she finds Wexford so exciting that she would not dream of living anywhere else.
